From Andy's Desk...

In our reading today we have a second amazing picnic provided by Jesus. He feeds a crowd of four thousand people with seven loaves and a few fish. I suspect it sounds familiar! But wasn't it 5000...?

Some people suggest that this is the same event as the amazing feeding of the 5000 back in chapter 6, but that Mark has either



got a bit confused about some different sources, or that he has made up this second miraculous picnic for his own purposes.

Straight away I hope that puts you on red alert. If that were true, it would mean Mark invented part of the Bible and put words into Jesus' mouth that Jesus didn't say. It would mean that what we are reading is not all eye-witness testimony or God's divinely-inspired word but that at least some of it was made up by people. It would be a recipe for chaos and confusion. How would we know what to believe? Everyone would just choose the bits they like.

But no. Every bit of the Bible is God's divinely-inspired word, given through Spirit-filled human authors. These writers had come to believe the earthshattering truth that Jesus is the Son of God and Messiah; the extraordinary events that they saw and heard were seared into their memories and stuck with them all through their lives, and they had absolutely no need to make up anything. Many of them even died for what they believed, and you don't die for something you know is a lie!

Peter puts it like this later in one of his letters (and remember that Peter is most likely Mark's eyewitness source):

For we did not follow cleverly devised stories when we told you about the coming of our Lord Jesus in power, but we were eyewitnesses of his majesty. 2 Peter 1:16

Mark was not cleverly devising another picnic, but recording what really happened as seen by Peter. And this is clear from the details: this second meal involved 4000 people who have been with Jesus for several days already outside of Israel in Gentile territory, 7 loaves, a few fish, 7 baskets of leftovers collected afterwards. Look back to chapter 6:30-44 and you'll find all the details are different. Mark expects us to understand that two separate real historical events took place.

However, the similarity between the feedings is important, of course. I'm sure we are meant to compare them - why? Because the feeding of 5000 in chapter 6 demonstrated Jesus' wonderful divine provision for his people Israel; the feeding of 4000 in chapter 8 demonstrated Jesus' wonderful divine provision for the Gentiles too. In both cases those who eat are completely satisfied and there is plenty to spare (6:42 and 8:8). This is particularly exciting given the conversation Jesus had with the Greek woman. Do you remember how she seemed to be content with the crumbs? This miracle straight away suggests that Gentiles who trust Jesus will be as deeply and completely satisfied as Jewish followers of Jesus. We don't just get the crumbs but we get to sit at Jesus' feast in the Kingdom of God. We can be forgiven and adopted, with all the blessings of full membership of God's family.
